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

With its unique diversity of settings, Pittenweem Arts Festival brings 120 artists to village venues in houses along the shore, by the sea and up the wynds; in the High Street galleries and round the corner at every turn. Church and cave, hall and harbour, all give space to a plethora of artists and their work.

Scotland has a rich cultural history and artists have been central to its reputation. From times immemorial, Fife and the East Neuk have had links with other sea going communities through the fishing industry, bringing contact with other cultures to our shores.

Parking; park & ride with festival shuttle bus daily from Saturday August 2nd-Sunday August 10th 10.00-5.00

We hope you find it easy to park using the designated carpark, with the help of our stewards and the trackway. To defray the costs involved, a donation of about £2 on leaving, would be appreciated.

Please do not take your car into the village and observe all Road Closed and Resident Only signs.



Disabled parking and toilet facilities are available adjacent to the shuttle bus stance in Charles Street car
park. There are also toilet facilities at West Braes, Coastline Community Church in Session Street, the
harbour, and the Church Hall in James Street (see map in centre pages).



The bus loops continuously (about 20 minutes between buses) from Charles Street car park, along the High Street down to the harbour and West Shore, returning by the main road to Charles Street car park. The driver will stop/pick up on request and help with buggies and non-motorised wheel chairs. This service is free, but donations on the bus are appreciated.

Invited artists

Over the 30 years of the Festival's existence, many well-known Scottish and internationally-acclaimed artists have accepted the invitation to be guest exhibitors.

Using the halls, churches and public spaces, artists including Ian Hamilton Finlay, Adrian Wiszniewski, Kate Downie Dovecot Studios, Will Maclean, Elizabeth Blackadder and Lil Neilson have exhibited at Pittenweem because of its reputation for artistic excellence and its unique festival setting.

All art-forms: sculpture, painting, environmental art and installations have been represented. Jephson Robb's Golden Age, a circle painted on the outer pier, created in 2006, can still be seen.

As is our tradition, this year's four invited artists bring artistic inspiration to our village. We are delighted that Steven Campbell, Sean Dooley, Marian Leven and Dugald MacInnes acepted our invitation to exhibit at Pittenweem.

Bursary award scheme

























In recognition of the importance of encouraging young artists and undergraduates to establish themselves on leaving art school, the Festival offers a bursary award each year to either final-year students or graduates, within the last five years, from any Scottish school of art. Candidates must also show a connection to Fife.

The bursary consists of a rent-free venue, a waiver of the registration fee and £250.

The 2013 selection process, from the many and varied submissions we received, was made by the Festival's Visual Arts Committee.

After graduating from Glasgow School of Art in 1982, with a coolly received degree show, Steven won a Fulbright scholarship to New York, a sojourn which enabled him to establish an international reputation.

In 1985 the highly-praised exhibition New Image Glasgow, curated by Sandy Moffat, comprised Campbell, Ken Currie, Peter Howson and Adrian Wiszniewski (Adrian exhibited at the 2008 Arts Festival). By 1987, Steven was back in Scotland, a return that Sandy Moffat in his Guardian obituary explains with Steven's comment:

I wanted to give myself more space coming back to Scotland ... In New York it was all happening so fast. You could get yourself in an awful mess.

The 1990 exhibition at Glasgow's Third Eye, On Form and Fiction was another critical success. Steven's health declined in the 90s and he was less noted save for another large exhibition in 1993 at the Talbot Rice in Edinburgh, Pinnochio's Present and again at the same gallery in 2002 with Caravan Club.

Lifting the Veil/Vale

Defined by The Times as: one of the most forceful and original artists to have emerged lately in Britain and by the Guardian as: The most exciting painter to emerge anywhere for many years, Steven's work has been described as figurative, realist, surreal and narrative. It is the latter adjective that draws most critical comment as references can be highly personal or obscure. Personal ones can be difficult but obscure ones (i.e. those not known to the commentator) rarely prejudice a painting.

This exhibition has been created in close cooperation with Carol Campbell, Steven's widow and will include a series of sketches never previously exhibited, along with memorabilia.



My work, executed in slate and shale, is a personal expression of thoughts and feelings on the fragile nature of our planet and the immense geological forces that underlie it. The work challenges our notions of nationality, for past geological events clearly indicate that there is no guarantee of continuity as far as the human race is concerned. The Earth's crust, with its constantly shifting tectonic plates concomitant with volcanic and seismic activity, is certainly a volatile environment in which to exist. This use of geology, in the form of the stone used in my art, I call Lithospherics.

Secrets of the Clock Tower, a set of images cataloguing a collection of posters and newspaper pinup artwor discovered on the walls of a church clock tower.

Landlocked, a documentary project looking at the ways people's aspiration and dreams manifest themselves.

Holding the Line, a project exploring the margins where land and sea meet, areas where human life and nature are in constant and sometimes forceful negotiation.

Every body of images is an exploration an investigation following a genuine curiosity for the subject. Central to the work is observation of the interaction between human life and its habitat.

As a boy I was entranced by nature and through taxidermy collections I could see animals from places that I'd likely never visit and extinct creatures that no one would ever have the chance to see again. These objects are sometimes the last remnants of our planet's lost and fading species and they continue to unlock my boyhood curiosity. Though often beautiful, they're an extremely poor substitute for having these animals live in the wild. I visited them to satisfy my own interest and documented them so that other people could share in their wonder.

The Festival's ART@47 is our High Street base purchased from Fife Council in 2009. The old Town Clerk's Office was refurbished in 2012, resulting in a flexible gallery/meeting/workshop space, available for hire to artists and the community.

For Christmas 2013 we held an exhibition of work by Pittenweem P6/7 who had been working together with local artist Malcolm Cheape.

We produced a Christmas card from that work which sold very well. The exhibition opened at the same time as carol singing by the primary and the Christmas lights switch-on, which had been organised by Pittenweem in Bloom.

As happened last year, a series of six coffee mornings were held in January and February which were hugely popular, our homebaking stalls have greatly improved.

As part of the Pittenweem Artists and Galleries weekend at Easter, Morag Muir returned with a solo exhibition entitled Italian Window.

Edinburgh-based artist Jeanie Laub later held a successful exhibition of her work based on vintage toys and times past.

Future events include: an exhibition by wildlife artist Derek Robertson running from August 23-31 (see his festival work on p21); a series of drawing classes tutored by John Kelly, a previous Festival bursary winner.
