





Once again, Pittenweem welcomes you to its annual Festival of the Arts. The challenge each winter is to plan something new, innovative and inspirational and then make sure we deliver in time for August. A daunting task, especially when all the work is carried out voluntarily.

The focus of the Festival is squarely on the visual arts. Community involvement and artistic excellence have been central

to the Festival's ideals since it began in 1982. Now, as a Major Event, our reputation attracts many more artists than the village can accommodate. The Festival does not select the artists who exhibit – you, the public do, by meeting, talking to and encouraging the artist of your choice by purchasing a work of art, or not!

While looking at paintings, installations or sculpture is enjoyable, taking part and being creative satisfies a deeper human need; so this year, artists who are passionate about their art are offering more workshops than before in photography, textiles, beach sculpture, animation and documenting the Festival itself.

Our acquisition of the box office. The Town Clerks Centre for the Arts, means not only a permanent base for the Festival, but once refurbished, will provide a year round arts resource for visitors and the local community.

Meanwhile, look out for a wandering tea trolley, a beach hut on the pier beside a shoal of knitted fish, and Maggie Moffat tells me that the Town Clerk is coming back to check out his old haunts! Have fun.

On behalf of the Board, I thank all artists and visitors for making Pittenweem Arts Festival the success it is.

Festival parking

There are 2 free car parks within the village, both located off the A917 and clearly indicated by yellow AA signs. See map for details.

Drivers from the west should follow the AA signs, and turn left into **Charles St.** car park.

Drivers from the east should follow the AA signs and turn left into West Braes car park.

Coaches should unload in Charles St. car park and then park in Anstruther—one mile.

Please do not take your car into the village unless to offload. Artists may deliver and collect but must return their vehicles to the car park.

The village has a one -way system, west to east along the High Street and waiting restrictions.

The road leading to the harbour is closed to traffic except for residents and business access. **THERE IS NO PARKING AT THE HARBOUR FOR VISITORS**Artists may deliver and collect but return to the car park

The road linking the High Street and University Avenue is also closed to traffic.

Disabled parking and toilet facilities are available adjacent to the shuttle bus stance in **Charles Street car park**.

Please observe all signs; police and traffic wardens will be on hand to assist.

Festival Shuttle Bus: park & ride daily from 10 -5

This bus loops continuously (about 20 minutes) from Charles Street car park to West Braes car park, along the High Street down to the harbour and West Shore, returning by the main road to Charles Street car park.

The driver will stop/pick up on request and help with buggies and non-motorised wheel chairs. This service is free, but donations on the bus are appreciated.

The Ovenstone Artists & Outbye Gallery bus leaves from Charles Street car park via the High Street and main road to Ovenstone on:

Saturday 1st; Sunday 2nd; Friday 7th; Saturday 8th; Sunday 9th.

Invited Artists 2008

Over the past 27 years of the Festival's existence, many well-known Scottish and internationally acclaimed artists have accepted the invitation to be our guest exhibitors.

Using the halls, churches and public spaces, artists including Will Maclean, Adrian Wiszniewski, Elizabeth Blackadder, Lil Neilson and Ian Hamilton Finlay have come to Pittenweem because of its reputation for artistic excellence and its unique festival setting.

All art-forms: sculpture, painting, environmental art and installations have been represented. Jephson Robb's *Golden Age*, a circle painted on the outer pier, created in 2006, can still be seen.

This year's invited artists are a celebration of the old and the new: the marine paintings of More Horsburgh documenting the fishing industry over the last fifty years to the highly contemporary designs in Thread of Gold. Traditional knitting skills have been updated in Deirdre Nelson's Fish Exchange while Marj Bond's paintings encompass timeless imagery in glorious colour. Masahiro Kawanaka's installation is a unique fremembrance of an earlier Pittenweem visit.

More Horsburgh

Venue



This year's More Horsburgh exhibition offers a splendid retrospective of one of the loved and respected local artists whose abilities have come to be widely admired. Mean Horsburgh was also one of the last of the true working class artists who, in the trad of Robert Burns rather than John Bellany, laboured to live and was inspired to create And as Burns ploughed the land and reaped his unmatchable lyrics, More Horsburgh ploughed the sea, and left an unparalleled record of the lives of its fishermen and the families, the work they did, the boats they sailed on throughout the changes wrough a lifetime at sea - though it is the East Neuk of the 1930s, particularly his home port Pittenweem, that contains the essence of the man and his work.



We are privileged to celebrate the endeavours of a humble but talented man, whos submersion of his artist's ego in his work was complete: a refreshing contrast to the artisan artists of today, whose inner worlds are assumed to be of public interest. It is precisely because More Horsburgh suppressed his private self that he remains for us now as perhaps the last of the great chroniclers of a vanished culture.




Since graduating from Glasgow School of Art in 1992, Deirdre has pursued a parallel career in creating work for exhibiton and commission and in working as a tutor to various groups. Hand skills are used in her work in a humorous commentary on social and textile history. Her work fuses traditional textile skills and contemporary reinterpretation through photography and digital manipulation.

She has been involved in community projects and artist residencies in Britain and abroad. In 2008 she was awarded a Jerwood Contemporary Makers award.

THE FISH EXCHANGE

The knitted fish project is a development of an ongoing project in Shetland called *The Fish Exchange* which has been created by Deirdre and Hazel Hughson of Shetland Arts. During a recent residency in Uist in 2008, Deirdre involved the local community in the knitted fish project. It proved to be extremely popular, drawing on the history of netting, knitting and fishing which is synonymous with fishing communities around the coast of Scotland. The fish were auctioned on eBay and a live auction was held to raise money for the **RNLI**.



Deirdre is delighted that the project has now extended to a new coastal area in Fife and that fish are being made for the Pittenweem Arts Festival.

.The group's title refers to the description of the fishing villages of Fife as a *Fringe* of *Gold* and also celebrates the art of working with traditional materials continually adapting them in the light of new technology and contemporary culture



Linda Green studied tapestry at Edinburgh College of Art and the Royal College of Art. Following two years abroad, she returned to Edinburgh. Her work has been inspired by her travelling which has influenced her choice of materials and informed her innovative working process. Linda has exhibited widely.

Craig Stuart is a self-taught jewellery maker who returned to college as a mature student, graduating in 1998 from Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art. He designs and makes unique pieces of fine jewellery using his contemporary adaptation of the ancient Japanese metalworking technique, mokume gane.





Gillian Cooper studied Textile Art at Goldsmiths College in London. Her highly conceptual work has been exhibited most notably in *The Cutting Edge*, a National Museums of Scotland exhibition. Her latest experimental work entitled 37 Steps is a series of


projections on and through knitted textiles, based on the repetition of daily life.

Janet Shelley studied Woven Textile Design at the Royal College of Art. Her career continued in London as a designer and lecturer. Jane has worked for a number of major textile companies in Britain and has exhibited in London, Paris and Madrid. Until this year she was Head Textile Design at Duncan of Jordanstone Colle of Art, Dundee.

Roger Morris studied Jewellery Design at the Royal College of Art and until recently was Head of Jewellery and Metal Design at Duncan of Jordanstone. He has exhibited internationally and his work is included in major permanent collections, including the Houston Museum of Fine Art and the Victoria and Albert Museum.





Hannah Louise Lamb studied Silversmithing and Jewellery at the R College of Art. She exhibits widely is British and European galleries. Her v has been shown in the Victoria and Albert Museum and the Masters and Protégés travelling exhibition in Japar Hannah's work is inspired by iconic imagery of 'home' and combines silv with materials such as silk, felt, ebon and slate.

Thread of Gold



Sarah Hutchison graduated in jewellery and Silversmithing from Edinburgh College of Art. Sarah works in silver with highlights of gold, using saw-piercing and raising techniques to explore themes of movement and texture inspired by natural forms. Her work is exhibited widely in Britain, Europe and USA.

Sue Heathcote studied Fashion Design at Leicester College of Art. Sue's work involves a combination of knitting and felting techniques, a fully integrated process, developing both fabric and form simultaneously. She exhibits nationally and internationally and was included in the Crafts Council exhibition Satellites of Fashion





Sara Keith trained in Embroidered and Woven Textiles at Glasgow School of Art continuing as a free-lance costume designer. In 2006 she embarked on a practice-based PhD, researching the use of traditional Japanese shibori dye techniques combined with the industrial process of silver electroforming.

Marj Bond

My paintings are developed through time and observation by drawing and photography. Colour and texture play a vital part in the visual vocabulary. The glyphs and marks emerge intuitively as the work develops. These glyphs and marks are fascinating to me as they are universal to other countries I visit. Other than the early writings of the Gaels and Celts these codes develop a life of their own in my work, appearing again and again.

I like the mystery and ambiguity the codes represent. I work in The Ancient Kingdom of Fife which is full of these ambiguities Now I am working on Collographs which suit my



layering-up of textures. I can prepa the plate in my studio, and print it of Fife Printmakers Workshop.

I trained in drawing and painting and sculpture to see line and tone of Glasgow School of Art. My confider in Colour developed over the years travelling from India to Spain ----Italy and more recently to Morocco and Cuba.

I am a member of The Scottish Soc of Artists and The Royal Society of Painters in Watercolours.

Bursary Award Scheme

In recognition of the importance of encouraging young artists and undergraduates to establish themselves on leaving art school, the Festival offers 2 bursary awards each year; one to a final year student in a Scottish School of Art whose home is in Fife, and another to an artist who has graduated from a Scottish school of Art within the last 5 years.

The bursary consists of a rent -free venue, a waiver of the registration fee and £200.

The selection process is independent of the Festival Board and Committee. We asked last year's main invited artist, Adrian Wiszniewski, to chose this year's winners from the many and varied submissions.

Clara Anderson, graduating this year from Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art and Design and Thomas Walker, a graduate of 2 years ago from Glasgow School of Art were Adrian's choice. Congratulations to both, and we wish you a successful Festival.
